




A new survey conducted by Whitman Insight Strategies (WINS) x The Resolute Group on behalf of The National Task Force to End Sexual and Domestic Violence (NTF) finds overwhelming and bipartisan support among voters for the recently introduced Violence Against Women Act (VAWA) Reauthorization Act of 2022.

**There is overwhelming and bipartisan support for VAWA reauthorization.**

Among voters nationally, a full 90% support reauthorization of the Violence Against Women Act in its current form. Support is strong — with 69% *strongly* supporting reauthorization — and bipartisan: 95% of Democrats, 88% of Republicans, and 84% of Independents support reauthorization.

Importantly, every facet of the current legislation — increased funding, access to emergency housing, non-discrimination provisions, law enforcement training, and restorative justice — has majority support among voters on both sides of the aisle.


**Voters believe VAWA reauthorization should be a top priority for Congress.**

93% of voters believe that it is important for Congress to reauthorize the Violence Against Women Act this year, and intensity is strong: 65% of voters say it is *very* important.

The demand for action is bipartisan: 95% and 92% of Democrats and Republicans, respectively, want this passed this year.

Nearly half of votes nationally (49%) believe that this should be the top priority for Congress, over all other legislative priorities.

**Voters want to see bipartisan action in Congress on VAWA reauthorization.**

A full 91% of voters nationally — Democrats, Republicans, and Independents alike — agree that VAWA reauthorization should receive bipartisan support in Congress and be a legislative priority for both Democrats and Republicans.

This legislation matters, as 88% of Democrats, 80% of Independents, and 78% of Republicans say a political candidate’s position on VAWA reauthorization will impact their vote in the upcoming midterm election.
